

Improve our camp facility

We will be installing energy efficient windows, updating furnishings and improving our outdoor spaces to better accommodate our growing number of camps and trainings.



Partner to engage the broader community

As our communities continue to grow in numbers and diversity, we are making efforts to engage a broader audience.

In 2016, we partnered with Mid Valley Elementary School (90% Hispanic student population) on a summer camp program that got kids into the Mt. Hood National Forest.
